Naplan

Students from grade 3 and 5 completed their NAPLAN testing yesterday. All the students who participated in the testing should be very proud of their efforts. I just wanted to reiterate that NAPLAN is not a pass or fail test, it just there to give an indication of where the students sits compared with students of a similar age. It is also used as an educational guide for schools who use the results to identify potential strengths and weaknesses in teaching programs and use this data to look forward to set future learning goals in literacy and numeracy.

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

When I first moved back to Victoria, we were pretty tight with cash, Andrew was working week on week off and I was just coming back into casual teaching after being on family leave. We were renting a little house in Sandy Point and some days it felt like the walls were crowding in on us – with a teenager and 2 little ones under 3.

We prioritised the things the kids needed – because that is what parents do, meaning Andrew and I would stretch out the time between dentist visits or shoes or clothes. We ate cheap cuts of meat and grew as much food as we could.

We counted our blessings and made fun with what we had.

One thing that was far down the radar of need, was shoes for mum (me!). Each time I thought I had enough cash for some leather boots, another bill would come in and the leather shoes would go on the back burner.

On my 37th birthday my little sister arrived with my gift. It was a beautiful red pair of zip up Doc Marten boots, I wept with gratitude that my sister could be so thoughtful and aware of shoe situation which I thought I was hiding well.

The first day I wore those boots, I stepped onto the wet grass on the Toora Primary School oval and my feet stayed dry, and I felt loved.

I wore those boots nearly every day for years.

These days I usually have a pair of boots but when I step out onto the oval and my feet stay dry, I still remember the feeling of the first day I wore my zip up red Doc Martens – I remember the relief of having dry feet and the kindness of my little sister.

One small act of kindness can ripple for ages.

Arborists Visit to Fish Creek Primary School

Last week our school had a visit from a crew of Arborists, here to clean up and remove any dangerous branches in our playground. On their departure our school was highly praised for its co operation of our students adhering to the safety barriers, allowing them to do their job. Below is an account of events from Mrs Smith's Grade 1/2.

'CRASH! BANG!"

We couldn't concentrate on our reading on Tuesday because some people were cutting down trees outside our building. We took our chairs and some paper and went out to see what they were doing. This is our report.

The arborists came to the school to chop the dead tree branches so they won't hit anyone's head, and to keep us safe. This is good for the trees because they can grow their branches back. They put tags on the trees to show the choppers which trees to cut. They had lots of safety equipment, like harnesses and earmuffs and helmets and they were professionally trained. The cutters used a chainsaw and a pole saw to cut the branches.

They talked a lot and were making great teamwork. They threw lots of ropes up into the trees to pull some of the branches down. One of the tree cutters climbed up a tree with a harness and rope to get high branches. (Heidi wanted to tell him that he was not allowed to climb up taller than Mr Banks!) The lady had to climb up to get the broken rope and it looked like she was just climbing on air. She was so fast!

Everyone was so shocked and it was very, very loud! When they started the chainsaw, it made a "BRRRMMMMM....ZZZZZ..." sound. A man was picking up the branches off the fence so they didn't fall in someone's yard. They put red and white tape out so people don't go in that area. The man asked us to tell the other grades not to touch the tags on the trees.


